- Large Print
- Parent Collection
- eBooks

Last year, almost 14,000 patrons attended our exciting programs. This year's budget includes increases for:

- Children's Programs
- Teen Programs
- Adult Programs
- Free Museum Pass Program
- Summer Reading Club

Please come to the Library on Tuesday, April 2 to cast your vote and participate in some of the special programs being offered that day.

Budget Vote FAQs

Q. Where can I find more information about the 2019-2020 budget?

A. Complete details will be mailed. They will also be available at the Circulation Desk and on our website, www.cshlibrary.org, after March 1.

Q. Will there be a public meeting about the budget and to meet the candidates for the Board of Trustees?

A. Yes, the Budget Review & Meet the Candidates meeting will be on Monday, March 18 at 7:00 p.m.

Q. Where do I vote?

A. You vote in the library on Tuesday, April 2 from 9:30 a.m. to 9:00 p.m.

Q. Who is eligible to vote?

A. All residents of the CSH School District who are registered to vote in the school district's annual budget vote are eligible to vote in the CSH Library election. Call Election Clerk, Susan Tyska, at (631) 692-6820, x501 for details.

Q. I will be away on April 2. Can I get an absentee ballot?

A. Yes, if you are unable to vote in person, you may apply for an absentee ballot. Applications will be available at the Circulation Desk and on our website after March 1.
