Q. Where can I find more information about the 2022-2023 budget?

A. Complete details will be mailed. They will also be available at the Circulation Desk and on our website, www.cshlibrary.org, after March 1.

Q. Will there be a public meeting about the budget and to meet the candidates for the Board of Trustees?

A. Yes, the Budget Review & Meet the Candidates meeting will be on Monday, March 21 at 7:00pm.

Q. Where do I vote?

A. You vote in the Library on Tuesday, April 5 from 9:30am to 9:00pm.

Q. Who is eligible to vote?

A. All residents of the CSH School District who are registered to vote in the school district's annual budget vote are eligible to vote in the CSH Library election. Call Election Clerk, Susan Tyska, at (631) 692-6820, x501 for details.

Q. I will be away on April 5. Can I get an absentee ballot?

A. Yes, if you are unable to vote in person, you may apply for an absentee ballot. Applications will be available at the Circulation Desk and on the Library's website after March 1.

The qualifications for Library Board candidates are U.S. Citizenship, eighteen years of age, and residency within the Cold Spring Harbor Central School District for at least one year prior to the election. There will be an election for three 3-year terms and one 1-year term. Petitions can be obtained at the Library from the Election Clerk, Susan Tyska, Monday through Friday, 9:30am-5:00pm. Completed petitions must be returned to the Election Clerk by Friday, March 4, 5:00pm.
